Media Highlights:

Action for Children, McDermott Group and WEA Scotland

WEA Scotland has again been generating more "column inches" of news copy through its successful partnership with Action for Children and the McDermott Group: a successful building contractor in Inverclyde and Glasgow. This project aims to provide young people from disadvantaged backgrounds with an "earn while you learn" training opportunity.

The young people work with the McDermott Group on a training programme that will qualify them to become Domestic Energy Assessors in around 18 months. During this training period they receive training by WEA Scotland in transferable skills such as literacy, numeracy and employability that will give them the best possible preparation for a permanent job and also lead to them gaining a recognised qualification. This project highlights the positive impact that can be made through effective partnership working and the WEA's commitment to delivering learning to improve life chances for everyone.

CYPIEF and ALEC Conference

This conference took place on 15th March and was attended by WEA Scotland's Strategic Projects Implementation Manager: Kirstine Simpson. Throughout this conference photographs and video links for a range of WEA learning programmes were showcased on a continuous slide show that was shown on screens across the venue demonstrating to all delegates the quality and breadth of the WEA's education offer.

The theme of the Conference was "Evidencing Impact". The conference programme is attached at the end of this item for those who would like further information. The clear message was that [at a time of pressing budgets] it is essential that all organisations record what they do, how they do it and can clearly evidence the impact and contribution they make to national and regional policy objectives. They should also look wherever possible to work effectively in partnership as this might enable them to achieve and contribute more than they could do as a standalone organisation.

Kirstine reported that the conference provided a number of significant networking opportunities and workshops and there was an opportunity to share thoughts on "what can I help with" and "what do I need help with" that may be the catalyst for future partnership working between the WEA and other partners across the sector.



University of Aberdeen and Reach Out Project

Ross Weatherby, Education Coordinator for the Reach Out Programme in the North East, attended an Erasmus Programme event in Portugal. This event was attended by learning professionals from Austria, Greece, Germany, Holland and Scotland to consider the possible impact of mobile technologies on learning.

The delegates considered the extent to which the provision of new curriculum materials could be enhanced through the use of mobile technologies and the impacts these developments might have for widening education participation. Ross returned to Scotland with some new ideas on how he might apply what he learned in Portugal for the benefit of his Reach Out Learners.

Developments across Scotland

WEA Women's Group Boness Activity

The WEA Women's Group in Bo'ness was established in October 2016. It highlights perfectly the breadth and depth of learning provision across the WEA and the contribution to wider community development.

Their range of provision includes topics on health and wellbeing such as mindfulness, yoga, self-hypnosis and relaxation. In terms of community empowerment and engagement, they have visited the European Parliament, had presentations from the Children's Panel and are actively engaged with a number of local issues. They also have an active programme of ongoing events on topics such as local history, creative writing, culture and heritage.

The development of a discrete Women's Group within the WEA is a relatively recent development in Scotland and one which other Local Associations may also want to consider. Helen Jeffrey and Marc Sherland would I am sure, be happy to provide help and support on this for those who chose to explore this further

WEA Highland and NessBookFest

The WEA in Highland is part of a very successful partnership and community book festival called NessBookFest. The festival runs a number of public events and a schools programme under a "no barriers policy" that aims to encourage develop and promote literacy across the Highlands. WEA tutor Margaret Henderson delivered a very successful creative writing workshop while Norman Newton, Scottish Vice Convenor and Secretary of Highland Local Association, has led a number of guided walks around Inverness. A quick search will reveal the extent of the NessBookFest activities, the number of writers involved and the scale of books and publications of those who contribute.

Pauline MacKay: the Convenor of the WEA Highland Local Association is Programme Coordinator for the NessBookFest which this year has been shortlisted for the Epic Awards. These were set up in 2010 by Voluntary Arts to promote participation in creative and cultural activities. Good Shop Project

The Good Shop Project will take place between 26th and 31st March at Buchanan Galleries in Glasgow. The Good Shop Project is a partnership between the WEA West of Scotland Branch, Writing Community Groups from Larkfield and the Word Factory, and the Burns Community, especially the Robert Burns World Federation.

During this week the Good Shop Project aims to raise awareness of literacy and writing skills generally and Robert Burns in particular, through a range of workshops, talks, events and performances. This week long event is an excellent example of how the WEA can and does work with other partners to creatively introduce learning through a range of different methodologies and settings that might engage with people who otherwise may not have considered learning or that they had the capacity or capabilities to learn.
