WEA Scotland Meeting with Education Scotland and Scottish Government

I met with Education Scotland and Scottish Government in late July for our six monthly monitoring meeting and am pleased to report that their feedback was very positive. They welcomed the significant improvement in the organisation's finances notably the recent growth in income. They advised that a new fund (to replace the current ALEC Fund) will be launched in 2019/2020 for implementation in 2020/2021. While the objectives would not necessarily be like for like, the current over achievement of targets by the WEA would provide a persuasive case for the continuity of funding.

The education delivery by the WEA continues to be held in very high regard. The ALEC Report prepared by Shirley Howitt in conjunction with the Area Education Managers and Education Coordinators, continues to set the standard across the sector in relation to the quantity and quality of information submitted. Education Scotland were particularly pleased that we had unilaterally and proactively instigated a quality audit of our provision and had produced an action plan aimed at greater standardisation of our quality processes and ongoing improvement of all our provision.

The recent work in relation to improving our policies and procedures for Safeguarding was also welcomed and our efforts to comply with the newly introduced GDPR Regulations were described as sector leading. This is an area of significant challenge for the sector. Education Scotland have advised us that our work in this field is a model of best practice that they would like to share mode widely across the sector and within Scottish Government.

WEA Scotland: Income Growth for 2018/2019

As many people across the WEA will be aware there have been significant challenges to our financial sustainability for a number of years. The situation has significantly improved in the past couple of years to a point where the organisation is at or close to a breakeven budget. While this has been a huge step forward it still did not provide the basis of medium to long term financial sustainability. In the past few weeks however there has been a step change that can potentially create the beginnings of the organisation moving to a sustainable financial footing.

Clare Harper and the Team in Aberdeen (Ross Weatherby, Kevin McPherson and Morag MacDonell) have just secured a significant amount of money for the next three years while in Glasgow, Kathleen Richardson and Craig Brown have also won a significant contract with one of our major partners. At the time of writing, I am unable to provide more details as the official communications in relation to both projects has yet to be finalised and agreed. More details will however be circulated in due course and also appear in the next edition of the e-brief

Alongside these large new income streams, there have also been new contracts awarded to the WEA from the Department of Work and Pensions through bids made by Kathleen Richardson, Craig Brown and Ross Murray. Our STUC provision also continues to flourish thanks to the work of Kirstine Simpson, Archie Campbell and Craig Finnie.

This new and significant additional income should be celebrated by all across the WEA. Its achievement has been a real team effort with lots of work done by all involved. In addition to the Area Education Managers and Education Coordinators, the Finance Team (Judith MacDonald and Janice Wimpenny) have been a huge assist in the preparation of the bids, frequently doing this work against very pressing deadlines. Now all we have to worry about is delivering all this work!

WEA Learner and Partnership Success Stories

Women in the Highlands: Belladrum Tartan Heart Festival





The Women in the Highlands Project aims to encourage and empower Highland women to develop their potential in the workplace the community and at home. The Belladrum Tartan Heart Festival is a music and arts festival founded in 2004. It has quickly evolved into one of the biggest events in the Highland and has been a sell out every year since 2008.

The aim of taking the project to the Belladrum Tartan Heart Festival was to maximise impact raise awareness and reach as many people as possible in a very short time. The creative work at the heart of this project has a proven empowering effect. If women can find ways to express themselves creatively, the confidence they gain profoundly affects the rest of their lives and can be a stepping stone towards higher levels of confidence and engagement.

The main activity that the WEA showcased at the event was an art installation. This installation was to be composed of mini canvases on which visitors to the marquee could create a self-portrait. The aim was to create 100 portraits (one for each year from 1918 when some women were given the vote). In the end, 116 portraits were completed some of which can be seen in the photos above. In addition to the self-portraits the WEA also hosted an Open Mic session on each of the three evenings the festival took place. This provided a forum for female performers to share their skills in creative writing, drawing, poetry readings and music. Over 40 people attended these sessions and the feedback received very positive.

Andrea Johnson and Larissa MacDonald are currently working on sharing the portraits from the festival across the region. The project clearly achieved its aim of reaching and engaging with a large number of people quickly and based on the feedback received is sure to be repeated next year.

Gareth has a hearing impairment which makes his achievement all the more impressive".

Congratulations to Gareth on such an excellent achievement. Testimonies like this are so important not just for the learner but for their families and friends. It is life changing education and but for the WEA, the chances of this success being realised by other means would be very slight
