At four Strategy Launch Days in London, Birmingham, Edinburgh and Leeds, the WEA Strategy 2025 was launched discussed and debated. Staff, members and volunteers from every part of the UK participated in a series of workshops designed to start the discussions on how the targets and opportunities within the strategy might be delivered and how some of the challenges may be overcome.

At the event in Edinburgh, WEA Scotland colleagues were joined by a number of delegates from the North East of England, members of the WEA Scotland Board and UK Trustees. This combination of skills, experience and different geographical and educational contexts created stimulating and productive discussions throughout the day and some practical recommendations for joint working between Scotland and the North East of England that could be taken forward relatively easily and quickly. Morven May McCallum inspired delegates with her story of managing and recovering from Lyme Disease, completing her formal education as an adult learner and going on to write and publish her first novel: Finding Joy.

Another very welcome addition and new initiative at this year's AGM was the contribution of WEA learners. WEA



learners joined staff from each of the local areas in describing the learning that is taking place across Scotland. It was illuminating for delegates to hear this learner perspective and the difference that learning has made to each individual learner. Beyond the impact for each individual learner it also enabled delegates to hear this learner perspective, to re-enforce the importance of taking learner views into account and changing provision as required to meet different learner needs.

Women in the Highlands

The Women in the Highlands Project have been receiving a significant amount of media attention recently for their work on the suffrage activity of women and men in the Highlands. Specifically this focussed on their campaigning activity for the right to vote from around 1870 to the period leading up to world war one. The project created a library display that has been well attended and was featured in a number of the local and regional media outlets. The work was also the feature of a Choir performance in the Strathpeffer Pavilion. The Education Coordinator, Andrea Johnson was interviewed about the project on BBC Scotland's Richard Holloway Programme and the Choir performance has also featured on You Tube.
